Deveen C. “Red” Landerger was born Aug. 31, 1922, and passed away on Jan. 10. He was 86.

Deveen worked for his parents, Mode and Babe, at Hoselton Lumber Company from 1937 to 1950. He served in the US Navy during World War II, stationed on the USS California, which was moored on Battleship Row during the attack on Pearl Harbor. He was later assigned to the USS Detroit.

In 1950, Deveen moved to California, where he ventured into law enforcement. In 1961, he met Bette and they were soon married. In the years to come, Deveen worked his way up from deputy to detective and finally to undersheriff in Bishop, Calif. He retired from police work in 1971 and moved back to Corvallis in 1975.

Deveen went back to work for his parents, this time at Marysville Golf Course and retired from there in 1988. In retirement, Deveen and Bette spent countless hours with their Arabian horse Bint Deja Vu at Hawk Ridge Farm. They enjoyed many trips to Gold Beach, golfing around Oregon and to Spirit Mountain for a day’s gambling. He was the luckiest person gambling and much of his luck rubbed off on Bette.

Bette passed away on Sept. 22, 2008. Deveen is survived by his son, Doug, and daughter-in-law Mona Hoselton; daughter Beth and son-in-law Gene Bonham; two granddaughters ;and four great-granddaughters.
