



## Earl Nyberg

August 18, 1921 - March 30, 2008

Earle J. Nyberg died peacefully at home on March 30. He was 86.

Earle was born in Arcadia, Neb., to Albert and Pearl Nyberg. He graduated from Corvallis High School in 1940, and attended Oregon State University for two years. He then moved to Vallejo, Calif., and worked in supply stores for the U.S. Navy for six years. Around 1950, he returned to Corvallis and worked for many years until retiring as a manager for Corvallis Concrete Pipe.

Earle was married to Dorothy Muirhead Nyberg from 1953 until she died in 1972, and to Thelma North Nyberg from 1972 until 2004. He was a past exalted ruler of the Corvallis Elks Lodge and also served as district deputy for the Elks. He loved to square dance and was a member of the local stamp collectors club.

Survivors include his brother, Robert and Mary Nyberg of Las Vegas, Nev.; step-children, Ron, Ellen, Kathryn and Mary; and numerous grandchildren, nieces and nephews.

Graveside services will be at 1 p.m. Friday, April 4, at Oak Lawn Memorial Park Cemetery.
