



Gladys Ingram

November 9, 1922 - February 7, 2014

On Friday, Feb. 7, 2014, Gladys May Ingram, 91, of Monroe went home to be with Jesus.

She was born to Marion and Ima Belle (Pollard) Rainey on Nov. 9, 1922, in Idabel, Okla.

When Gladys was little, the family moved to Borger, Texas, and then to Sudan, Texas, where she spent much of her childhood. They later moved to Long Beach, Calif. There Gladys worked for Douglas Aircraft during World War II. Gladys was one of the original Rosie the Riveters, and really enjoyed working on the airplanes.

In the mid-1940s, the family moved to Monroe, where Gladys met Albert Ross Ingram. The two were wed on Oct. 13, 1946, in Albany. They were married 55 years, until Albert's passing in 2001.

Gladys was a longtime member of the Lancaster Church of Christ. She was proud of her grandmother Ocie Belle Pollard. She often told the story of how her grandma would come home from church, change out of her Sunday best, and take off walking down the road to knock on doors and tell people about Christ.

Gladys passed on to be with Christ at the home of her grandson, Tony Brockman, in Corvallis.

Gladys is survived by her children and their spouses, Patricia (Clay) Barnts of Monroe, Butch (Shelly) Ingram of Junction City, and Donna Brockman of Monroe; eight grandchildren; 19 great-grandchildren; two great-great-grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Albert; brother, Chesley Rainey; and sisters Betty Ford and June Charles.

Visitation is set for 2 to 5 p.m. today (Wednesday) at McHenry Funeral Home in Corvallis. A funeral service will take place at 1 p.m. Thursday at the funeral home. Burial will follow at Alford Cemetery near Harrisburg.
