April 16, 1920 - February 22, 2014

Harriet Elizabeth Shaw died Feb. 22, 2014.

She was born in Heppner, the daughter of James O. and Emma Baird Hager. She attended Oregon State University, where she acquired the nickname "Happy." She married Clayton A. Shaw on Aug. 5, 1945, who often called her Hap.

A homemaker, she lived in several states and in Germany with her family while her husband was in military service. She enjoyed golfing and gardening and did volunteer work for the Red Cross and the OSU Thrift Shop. She was a member of Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority, BP Chapter of PEO and First United Methodist Church.

She is survived by her son, Steven M. Shaw; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Clayton A. Shaw; son Robert W. Shaw; infant son Kevin James Shaw; and brothers Jim and Homer Hager.

Private family services will be held at Willamette National Cemetery. Memorial contributions can be made to the Robert W. Shaw Scholarship Fund through the Oregon State University Foundation.
