December 1, 1948 - March 24, 2015

Margaret Lee Hall, 66, was born in Medford, the only daughter of Earl and Carmin Forgey Hall.

She lived in Southern Oregon until she moved to Corvallis in April 2014 to live in the Evergreen Group Home. Margaret died March 24, at home, of complications of Alzheimer's disease and pneumonia.

Margaret went to elementary school in Medford. When she lived in Gold Beach she had her own apartment and a job through a vocational program for persons with developmental disabilities. In 1997 she moved to a foster home in Brookings, and from there to Corvallis last year.

In Corvallis she was a valued resident of the Evergreen Group Home and an engaged participant in the Choices vocational program, both under the auspices of Bridges Enterprise.

Margaret was an extraordinarily observant and witty contributor to group discussions. She loved flowers and trees, cats and dogs, any music, live theater performances and concerts, the circus. She loved good food: her favorite, anything chocolate. Even when she could no longer swallow, a few drops of chocolate milk on her tongue brought a smile to her face. She loved the old TV classics: "Walker, Texas Ranger," "The Waltons," "Little House on

the Prairie,” Animal Planet.

Her favorite clothes were pink, blue and purple, and she left this world in a nightgown filled with butterflies and her favorite Viking cap from the Scandinavian Festival.

She was a talented photographer, so proud of winning a blue ribbon at the Curry County Fair.

Margaret was preceded in death by her parents and her only brother. She is survived by her sister-in-law, Beverly Hall; a nephew; and her Bridges family of other residents and a caring staff. Special thanks are due the Evergreen Group Home staff and the staff of Choices vocational program, who cared for her with excellence. She will be missed by her friends, other clients and residents of the Group Home.
